

Giulia Damiani is a writer and curator based in London, and a PhD researcher in Art at Goldsmiths University. Her collaborations with galleries and various institutions across the world have been funded by public bodies such as the European Cultural Foundation and the Italian Ministry of Cultural Heritage and Activities. Her writing has been published widely in art and cultural magazines such as EROS press as well as catalogues and independent publications. She has given talks at a wide range of institutions, including The White Building and The Showroom (London), The Studio (Jordan), ODD (Bucharest), Philosophy Institute (Naples), Goldsmiths University, Royal College of Art and the University of Minho (Portugal).

Since 2015 she has been the editor and curator of the art platform Elizabeth Xi Bauer. In 2016 she was the recipient of the Step Beyond Grant for her writing residency in Amman, Jordan. She is currently working on the exhibition and publication *Coated in Pre-existence*, opening in September in London.
